Montreal premiere, with guests / A sharp investigation into the origins of the climate crisis and anti-environmental policy that plumbs historical records to reveal the US government's death grip allegiance to the fossil fuel lobby.



MICHAEL T. WORKMAN & KEI PRITSKER / USA / 2025 / 81'

With guests / Following recent campus protests against Israel's genocide in Gaza, this timely account focuses on the university encampment movement, while linking the entrenchment of the the perpetrator's lobby into higher education institutions.

With guests / A bold chronicle of LGBTQ2S+ activism in Canada, PARADE celebrates a lesser known history that helped launch a national movement for queer rights and equality, as told by some of the path-breakers who were there.

Montreal premiere, with guests / As the world witnesses the vile rise of anti-immigrant fascist rhetoric, UNWELCOMED is a cinematic portrayal of the shocking discord that resulted from thousands of Venezuelans making their way north to Chile.

J.A. De Sève Cinema - Montreal premiere, with guests / Why don't more Jews and Israelis speak out about Palestine? Artist and filmmaker b.h. Yael responds to this question with an intimate essay film that reflects on her family's story, combining archival images with diary narration.
